The course explores the relationship between interior spaces, architectural forms and human experience/interaction in those spaces, with a focus on form, colour, texture, light, brand, structure and experience.

Through structured analysis, research and exploration, Interior Architect Designers create experimental, imaginative and stimulating environments, in specific locations, for specific user groups.

Students are taught about the fundamentals of Interior Architecture and Design including: space planning / orthographic representation / scale / ergonomics and anthropometrics, etc, alongside developing a comprehensive understanding of the use of colour, lighting, materiality, detailing, form and function.

Students are encouraged to develop unique interior architecture design / spatial proposals for a number of different environments including: leisure, bars, restaurants, workspace, retail, theatre and exhibitions - the realm of the professional interior designer is extremely wide, and our course aims to provide a rounded experience in all aspects of this very exciting career path. Where possible design briefs are collaborative in nature, with real sites, real clients and opportunities to network with professional practitioners whilst learning.

Educational Aims:

The course focuses on the development of your abilities in the following areas:

Enquiry: The course will enable you to develop and use various academic and practical enquiry skills from a range of key ideas from practice and art and design theory. You will also acquire personal and practice-based skills in areas of specific relevance in contemporary Interior Architecture Design, notably space form colour texture light brand structure - architectural form and experience, through the use of 2d and 3d representation: by use of orthographic and hand generated presentations. 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
